I am pleased to present Cook County's 2021 Sustainability Report, which outlines the County's efforts to support healthy and resilient communities that thrive economically, socially and environmentally.

Sustainability is an environmental justice issue. Those who live in low-income communities have borne the brunt of pollution from the old fossil fuel economy and have also been disproportionally affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Cook County is addressing these issues by:



- Issuing requests for proposals to procure a large portion of our energy from a renewable source.
- Winning a 2021 National Association of Counties Achievement Award for our Clean Energy Plan, which details our path to carbon neutrality.
- Launching the C-PACE (Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy) program to provide favorable financing to commercial and industrial properties investing in energy and water efficiency, clean energy and resiliency.
- Developing the Cook County Bike Plan, which will focus on expansion, equity and enhancement.
- Granting 16 Solar Schools funds to educate youth about renewable energy.
- Achieving significant sustainability milestones from 2019–2020, including an overall reduction in greenhouse gas emissions from County facilities and operations of 10.7%, and reduction in water use of 5.3%.

The Forest Preserves of Cook County adopted a Clean Energy Framework and released its Sustainability and Climate Resiliency Plan progress report which includes the restoration of 4,362 acres to natural conditions and an offset of 100% of emissions from electricity and natural gas use.

I supported the passage of the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act, which became law this year and will directly help traditionally underserved communities by improving air quality and getting people back to work in jobs that pay living wages and support the new clean energy economy.

We must do as much as we can as quickly as we can to fight climate change and we are building upon a solid foundation of accomplishments. I look forward to even more progress in the coming year.

OFF-SITE POWER PURCHASE AGREEMENT RFP

As part of our Clean Energy Plan commitments, Cook County released a request for proposal (RFP) for a renewable energy off-site power purchase agreement (PPA). The PPA will allow Cook County to purchase a large portion of its electricity supply from a renewable source as soon as 2023.

The PPA will help bolster the local green economy, improve air quality and add renewable energy to the electric grid.

The PPA is expected to generate 69,000 to 96,000 MWH of energy which will prevent 94,000 metric tons of greenhouse gas (GHG) emission reductions. This is equivalent to emissions from powering 16,000 homes.

Equity

Cook County announced its **Racial Equity Policy** and **Racial Equity Action Plan** to ensure equity is operationalized through Cook County Offices Under the President. The policy defines equity as it relates to the formulation of policy, updating policy and the tangible delivery of government services and resources.

The Department of Transportation and Highways is developing the Cook County Bike Plan focusing on expansion, equity & enhancement.

The Brownfield Program has assessed 66 sites totaling 487 acres and created or retained approximately 600 jobs through site reuse.

C-PACE FINANCING LAUNCH

The Ramova Theater in Bridgeport is the first participant in Cook County's recently launched **Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy (C-PACE)** program. Closed since1985, the 100-year-old theater will reopen after renovations featuring a live entertainment space, restaurant and brewpub.





Three-year pilot project reduces fares up to 50% on Metra Electric and Rock Island lines as well as Pace route 352 Halsted for south Cook residents.





Reductions were made in overall County GHG emissions, County building emissions, transportation emissions and total water use.




COUNTY BUILDING GHG EMISSIONS
